Year 3 visit British Museum



Last Friday, year 3 set off for the British Museum to use primary sources to help them learn about life in Ancient Egypt. They proved themselves to be true Interested Inquirers as they used artefacts to help them answer some big questions about their history topic:

What does the evidence tell us about the everyday life for men, women and children? How do we know about Egyptian beliefs about the afterlife? How were people able to work out what the hieroglyphics meant? Why was the River Nile so important to the ancient Egyptian? Why do we remember Ancient Egypt so much better than the other ancient civilizations?

In 3 Pearl, we were particularly impressed by Nusaybah who was 'doggedly determined' to answer every question in her research booklet.











Year 6 visit Hampstead Heath

On Tuesday, Year 6 spent the day on Hampstead Heath. They began by doing some orienteering; this requires using a map and compass to navigate from point to point. The points, or posts, are marked on the map and when you find one it has a letter on it which you have to record as evidence. It involved a lot of exercise - everyone definitely did over 10,000 steps that day!










Final week of Dance Club

Year 1 Art

In Art this week, children in Year 1 used three different methods to create a piece of artwork.

Leaf printing - The children designed and created templates of leaves with great

detail with bumpy / wavy / zigzag edges and veins. They used techniques such as to press, roll and stamp. Following the instructions was just as important too.

My polystyrene kept breaking in half - **Hussein** Sunset - Once we learnt how to achieve orange we created an African sunset by mixing together yellow and red. We started by crayoning a sun for the background. Then we did a red horizontal line across the top of the paper. Next to create the different

shades we kept adding a little yellow after painting each line. We noticed the shades of orange kept getting lighter and lighter until it was nearly yellow. Whilst our sunset were drying, we cut out the fore ground, African animal and tree silhouettes before creating the final scene.

They have also been matching the animals to the different structures that they build. For example, a beaver builds a dam.








EYFS at Argyle Primary School - Nursery


