This afternoon, pupils celebrated Eid across the school. They enjoyed their class Eid parties, the children wore their best party clothes and



## **Year 1 Science**

In science this week, the children have explored their sense of taste. We looked at our tongue closely and distinguished the different tastes. They are sweet, salty, bitter, sour and umami. Did you know that Umami is the Japanese way of describing things that taste complex or just unexplainably delicious. Can you tell which part of the tongue tastes each? #### **Camden Learning Centre Trip**

Yesterday the children visited the Camden Learning Centre. Firstly they explored how to program beebots to travel from A

to B with single steps and then with multisteps, A to B to
C. Then the pupils learnt how to make a diversion in A to B
with a block. Once the children mastered the beebots practically, they used the
computer to program on an app. This led the children to program Angry
bird. Eventually the children had to match programming codes to the Angry bird

### Year 3

This week 3 Pearl have been busy exploring what they already know about new topics in History and Science.

#### **History**

We started out in the playground locating Egypt on a world map and also using our giant timeline to delve deeper into what is meant by Ancient Egypt.

#### Location

Asila: Egypt is in North Africa, close to Sudan, Libya and Saudi Arabia.




Chronology (time)

We are now using pictures and artefacts to look at how archaeologists piece together the evidence about how people lived thousands of years ago.

#### **Science**

The children used a range of equipment to explore their initial ideas about Forces and Magnets.

They used this word bank to help structure their ideas:






























The car goes slowly down the black side it is quite rough. On the red side it goes much faster. - Olha

## **EYFS at Argyle Primary School - Reception**

This week the children in Reception continued to learn the story of 'Jack and the Beanstalk' using actions to help them remember it. As the story is about a beanstalk that grows and grows, the focus for the week has been on measuring using a range of equipment including rulers, metre sticks and measuring tape. The

children measured each other, items in the classroom and outside in the garden. They used vocabulary such as longer and shorter to help them compare objects.



# **EYFS at Argyle Primary School - Nursery**

In Nursery this week, the children have continued to use 'The Very Noisy Foxes' as the stimulus for their learning. They were able to join in with the story which is a key aspect of the early years curriculum, and retell the story using a range of props. After reading the text, the children looked closely at Great Britain. They learnt that it is an island which means that it is surrounded by water. The children looked at a range of animals that live in Great Britain and talked about their habitats.

As many of the children in Nursery will soon be moving into Reception, we are working hard to ensure that they are ready to do so. In order to help get your child, you can:

- Help them to write their own names
- Practise counting to ten and beyond and help them to recognise the related numbers and count out the right amount of objects for numbers to 10.
- Always ask them to speak in full sentences.

These activities range from swimming for all the family, learn to swim short courses and junior gym. There really is something new for young people to get involved with in Camden this half-term. The Holiday Programme runs from Monday 29<sup>th</sup> May – Sunday 4<sup>th</sup> June 2023.

### Swim For All

No matter your fitness, 'Swim for All' sessions are perfect if you're looking to build your confidence, work on strokes, float away stress, or simply enjoy a casual swim with family and friends. 'Swim for All' sessions are suitable for all ages, in pools across Camden.

## Kids for a Quid

The Kids Swim for a Quid initiative will available in all of our leisure centres in Camden during February half-term from Monday 13th February. This half-term, under 16s will be able to swim in our pools during Swim For All sessions for £1, every day until 10am.

### Crash Courses

Our lessons are suitable for children 4 years and over. Teaching the essential swimming skills to ensure they learn to be safe in and around water. These courses cover basic techniques for all 4 strokes if you're a beginner or improving.

## **Junior Gym**

A dedicated session where teens and older children aged between 11-15 years old can access the gym and get active. Sessions have a member of staff present, so if you are unfamiliar with any equipment, you can always ask them for safety advice. All juniors, however, are required to book a junior gym induction prior to attending the session.

## Soft Play

Soft Play gives children the freedom to play and use their imagination in a specially-built maze of ball pits, slides and rope swings. We run drop in sessions through out the week and you are free to come along at any time to any session and join the fun.
